The Angus North and Mearns constituency was the scene of the launch for the North East Regional Campaign for next year's Holyrood elections. The campaign got a fantastic start at the Carron to Mumbai in Stonehaven with Alex Cole-Hamilton in August. It brought together around 70 activists for a fundraising lunch and campaign day.

The images from this event dominated the Press and Journal's article about the forthcoming battle for North-East seats. Both Yi-Pei and I were featured in <a href="PressReader.com">PressReader.com</a> - Digital Newspaper & <a href="Magazine Subscriptions">Magazine Subscriptions</a> as No 1 and No 2 on the list. Alex Cole Hamilton said for the Press and Journal: "Yi-pei and Michael are an absolute powerhouse as activists. With the Tories in absolute chaos, we are coming. With husband Martyn already making an impact as the Angus North and Mearns candidate, perhaps this will be next Lib Dem "powerhouse" the P&J will be featuring.

## Yi-Pei: "Fair deal for households from Dundee to Fraserburgh"

Yi-Pei Chou Turvey, our lead candidate on the North East list, is passionate about people and communities and well known as a tireless campaigner in local politics. This goes much

further back than her election as a Councillor for Banchory and Mid-Deeside.

Yi-Pei was born in Taiwan and grew up in Belgium. She is a mother of three children with husband Michael. Thanks to her upbringing, Yi-Pei is fluent in English, French and Mandarin. She started as a volunteer at age 11, helping to walk other children home from school safely. She has been involved with Oxfam, the Church, regional multi art centre, the scouts and a playgroup.

"Life is a constant balance to create a fair and equal world for society and ourselves," Yi-Pei says. She is worried about communities being split by rival nationalist agendas and disinformation on the internet.

"More than anything, we need to bring people together, connect to the community and the land we share. The Liberal Democrats work in every aspect to build a brighter future where the values of liberty and community can be found. These values are my values," says Yi-Pei.

She won her council seat in 2022 with the highest vote the party has ever achieved in that ward. She has campaigned on education and early years childcare, safer roads, health and social care and tackling the cost of living.

"I am ambitious for the region and will work hard to deliver swift local access to healthcare and a real commitment to a fair deal for households from Dundee to Fraserburgh. However, there is still more to do to improve the sense of community, our infrastructure and to help local schools," Yi-Pei says.

### WHY DOES THE REGIONAL LIST MATTER TO US

At a Scottish Parliament election in addition to constituency candidates there are regional list candidates. Those voting have two votes, one to elect the MSP in their constituency and a second to elect the MSPs for the region in which they reside. There are 8 regions and 7 MSPs are elected for each region.

For the constituency elections the first past the post system is used. The candidate with the highest number of votes wins. This system alone is unfair. It means that the number of seats won by a pollical party does not reflect the total number votes the party has received.

The election of regional list MSPs is designed to avoid this unfairness. It is a form of proportional representation. For the regional list voters vote for a party, rather than individual candidates (except that there can be individual candidates, not aligned to a political party). Each party submits a list of candidates for a region which is ordered numerically. If a party gains a seat it goes to the first candidate on their list. If they gain a second seat it goes to their candidate number 2 and so on. There are rules about how seats are gained which take into account how many seats parties have already gained, both list and constituency.

So use your votes wisely and vote for your Liberal Democrat constituency candidate and for the Liberal Democrats in your regional list. We have every chance to get Yi-Pei elected!

### STONEHAVEN SNIPPETS

### Across built-up areas in Aberdeenshire, permanent 20mph speed limits were introduced on Monday, 22<sup>nd</sup> September 2025.

The roll out of a lower speed limit in our towns and villages is not just a decision of Aberdeenshire Council, although the Infrastructure Services Committee of the council did approve a new speed limit policy in November 2020. This included a move towards 20mph speed restrictions being the norm in urban areas while maintaining a network of strategic routes with 30mph. This is also aligned with Scottish Government policy to see a safer speed limit in built-up areas by the end of 2025. Given that alignment, the council delayed the introduction of its new policy to be able to benefit from the Scottish Government commitment to fund all the costs associated with the implementation of the 20mph rollout through Transport Scotland.

In Stonehaven nearly all streets will now have the lower speed limit of 20mph. There are one or two sections of road, though, that will remain at 30mph. You can see the map for Stonehaven showing where 20, 30 or 40mph speed limits apply in and around the town as well as the speed limits for all communities across Aberdeenshire via the link below:

I realise that when 20mph is raised, people often worry that the criteria for its rollout in Scotland are the same as in Wales which they are not. A major difference is that, in Wales, 30mph roads lowered to 20mph



included sections of dual carriageway and rural road. In Scotland, these types of roads have been excluded from the rollout.

It will be a change, but the primary argument for doing it is a safer road network for every road user. Also, as the road network becomes safer, more people then feel able to opt for an active travel option like walking or cycling with the varied associated benefits for health and the environment.

Will the police enforce it? Police Scotland, like all public sector bodies, is facing significant resource pressures so they have indicated they will continue to focus on high-risk routes with higher speeds. However, there may well be some targeted enforcement if that was felt required.

My working days continue to be busy with case work, reading reports and briefings, and council and community meetings. I am chair of the Kincardine and Mearns Area Committee which sits every 3 weeks when the council is not in recess and chair of the Sustainability Committee which sits 4 times per year.

The financial pressures on Aberdeenshire Council continue to be acute, so if you have questions about how we are prioritising what we spend, please do get in touch and ask me about it. Sometimes you can see something happening and wonder why money is being spent on that, whilst there are potholes to be filled or weeds to be cleared. Often the answer comes down to different funding pots. The council may have grant funding which it can only spend for a specific purpose, and the activity is not being funded from our core funding sources which are the Scottish Government grant (60%), Council Tax (22%) and Business Rates (18%).

The Zoom link and agenda will be sent out by email nearer the date of the AGM. We will also circulate nomination forms for membership of the Executive Committee.


